More Than 85 Years Later, FAC&U as Important Now as Ever

In 1933, Florida's college and university presidents from all three non- profit sectors (2-year, 4-year, public and private), established the Florida Association of Colleges and Universities (FAC&U). This was at a time when Florida's higher education organizational structure was described by the Dean of Education at UF as "destined to be on the scrap heap." That was over 85 years ago.

Since then, FAC&U member presidents have maintained the importance of the organization for the purpose of constituting "a bond of union between its members in the work of advancing the interests of higher education in Florida…" For over eight decades, FAC&U has maintained a full membership of college and university presidents in Florida — through countless evolutions of governance structures and controversies.

Despite many differences among diverse post-secondary institutions – FAC&U creates the time and space for all presidents to address numerous topics of mutual concern. (Continued on Page 2)

Letter from the President

More Than 85 Years Later, FAC&U as Important Now as Ever (Cont.)

The following lists just a few of the issues FAC&U has addressed in its long history:

- FAC&U responded to **WWII** and the role of higher education in support of national defense, including campus safety plans for **air raids** and problems caused by the war, **the GI bill** and post-war curricula.
- FAC&U drafted legislation to thwart "Diploma Mills" in the mid-1940s.
- In 1957, FAC&U created a "Counselors Handbook" that garnered praise across the country for improving **articulation from high school to college**.
- In the 1960's FAC&U responded to state and national emphasis on high tech industries, the "race to space" and NASA.
- In 1963 FAC&U took a strong position on "academic freedom."
- With heightened student unrest and protests on campuses around the era of civil rights and Việt Nam, FAC&U presidents addressed integration and reappraised programs and services to better meet the needs of their students.
- Facing tax and budget woes in the 1980's, FAC&U aggressively sought and secured private **grants** along with state and national appropriations, dedicating much of its attention to institutional **leadership and financing**.
- In 1991, FAC&U was instrumental in establishing the Florida Campus Compact to encourage student community service and campus-community collaboration.
- In the rapid acceleration of technology, FAC&U presidents discussed issues like **distance learning** and post-secondary access.
- Since at least the turn of the century, (circa 2000-2017) the FAC&U membership included ALL 70 presidents from every state university, every state/community college and every non-profit independent institution. During this time, Annual FAC&U meetings introduced high quality presentations by thought leaders in higher education, futurists, key legislators, Governors, and more always with high evaluation marks from the presidents who have attended (roughly 30 to 40 of the 70 member presidents, primarily from the state college and independent sectors attended every year).
- In the Spring of 2011, FAC&U adopted a "Vision 2020" statement.
- In 2014, FAC&U adopted and presented a resolution to the Florida Legislature, urging the adoption of legislation to support military veterans returning to higher education. The "Florida GI Bill" was adopted by the Legislature and signed into law, making Florida a "welcome home" state for veterans and their families.

In very recent years, there have been a number of extenuating factors that have contributed to a decline in presidential participation: the ever-increasing demands on presidents' schedules, budget cuts, special sessions of the Legislature, state performance metrics, competition between institutions and across the three sectors, plus a growing number of presidents who are new to Florida. While a strong sense of camaraderie and a unified voice for higher education in Florida have long been the pillars of the FAC&U foundation, it seems even that may be diminishing. YET, many presidents that the FAC&U organization provides an essential neutral ground for ALL presidents to strengthen peer-to-peer relationships, engage in intellectual discourse, and think collectively about the broader issues impacting higher education and the world. Surely the aforementioned list of diverse issues of the day lends itself to a deeper discussion about what we, as presidents, would like to see and accomplish as a part of FAC&U in the future.

Welcome to the Board - Robert Boyd

The Independent Colleges & Universities of Florida (ICUF)—of which Rollins is a member—has announced that longtime president, Ed H. Moore, will be stepping down at the end of August. Moore will be replaced by ICUF general counsel Robert Boyd '85, who has long served Rollins' interests in front of the legislature.

Prior to assuming the role of president and CEO of ICUF, Boyd—who doubled majored in history and political science—served as general counsel of the organization since 1995 and as a practicing attorney in Florida. He leaves a position as managing partner of statewide law firm Sachs Sax Caplan, where he was co-chair of the firm's governmental and lobbying group. Boyd is currently an adjunct professor of business law at Flagler College.

A U.S. House committee passed legislation Thursday that supporters hailed as a "down payment" on a long-sought liberal goal: free college education for all. The sweeping measure from Rep. Bobby Scott (D-Va.), chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee, aims to help more Americans of all backgrounds obtain high-quality college degrees by increasing affordability, accountability and accessibility in higher education.



FBI Advises Universities on Chinese Economic Espionage By: Eric Tucker, Associated Press 10/7/19 Image: AP Photo

The FBI has been reaching out to colleges and universities across the country as it tries to stem what American authorities portray as the wholesale theft of technology and trade secrets by researchers tapped by China. The breadth and intensity of the campaign emerges in emails The Associated Press obtained through records requests to public universities in 50 states. The emails underscore the extent of U.S. concerns that universities, as recruiters of foreign talent and incubators of cutting-edge research, are particularly vulnerable targets.

The emails show administrators mostly embracing FBI warnings, requesting briefings for themselves and others. But they also reveal some struggling to

balance legitimate national security concerns against their own eagerness to avoid stifling research or tarnishing legitimate scientists. The Justice Department says it appreciates that push-pull and wants only to help universities separate the relatively few researchers engaged in theft from the majority who are not. READ MORE...

Senator Bobby Powell Proposes "Florida Internship Tax Credit Program" for Florida Businesses By: Florida

Companies themselves could soon get credit in Florida for providing internships. Legislation (SB 642) filed by state Sen. Bobby Powell would give tax incentives to employees that give opportunities to students. The West Palm Beach Democrat's proposed "Florida Internship Tax Credit Program" would cut businesses a break for bringing in student interns, so long as companies can prove some history of turning interns into employees.

The legislation sets up specific criteria for what qualifies as an intern and what criteria a company must meet within the program. Only interns who are seeking degrees from Florida colleges, universities or technical centers would count. Powell's program would be explicitly aimed at seniors and graduate students at these institutions. Academic requirements also get laid out in Powell's bill. READ MORE...

Former Rollins College President Thaddeus Seymour Sr., known for his volunteerism and commitment to his community, died Saturday, his family said. He was 91. Seymour moved to Winter Park in 1978 with his wife, Polly, and five kids to take the job as the 12th president of Rollins College and served in office for 12 years.

"It was a very peaceful passing, surrounded by family," said his son Thaddeus Seymour Jr., the interim president at the University of Central Florida. "At 91, you can't do better than that. "Rita Bornstein, who succeeded Seymour as Rollins president in 1990, remembered that he ordered the bells at Knowles Memorial Chapel to chime after her appointment was announced.

Born in New York City in 1928, Seymour attended Princeton University and graduated from the University of California at Berkeley. He earned his master's degree and Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina. READ MORE...
